Emily Joyce

Deal, or, How I Became Radioactive

Returning for her third solo exhibition with the gallery, David B. Smith Gallery is pleased to kick off the 2026 exhibition season with *Deal, or, How I Became Radioactive*, by California-based artist Emily Joyce. Featured in the Main Gallery, Joyce's use of geometric abstraction to explore hidden systems, art history, and games comes bursting to the surface in this expansive yet sharply focused exhibition.

Following in a long line of artists from Italian Renaissance master Piero della Francesca to computer art pioneer Vera Molnar, Joyce investigates systems and connections: natural, mathematical, scientific, and philosophical. Explored through her special brand of visual and linguistic riddles, Joyce flattens the distance between time and space, using high-key geometric forms to puzzle at the eternal mysteries of our world and better understand our own time.

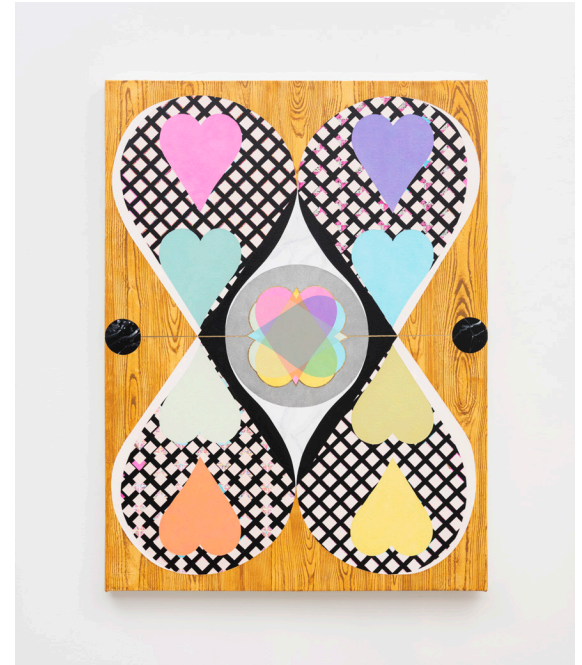
Inquisitive and playful, *Deal, or, How I Became Radioactive* incorporates essential qualities of both human nature and fundamental scientific concepts through the lens of games, namely, playing cards. Notions of freewill vs. determinism and chance vs. strategy are investigated in all the paintings presented—often quite literally. For example, for *All In (Three Hands)*, Joyce used a shuffled deck of cards to determine the painting's subject and composition. Pick a card, any card.

Borrowing from the philosopher Alan Watts's "Game of Life" concept that life isn't a serious problem to be solved but a playful dance or game to be experienced, Joyce's compositions feature figure eights, spirals, playing card suits, and backward script—details that offer a sense of levity across visual and conceptual forms.

Measuring the certainty of scientific truth against human intuition, Joyce still allows ample space for beauty in the equation. Her artistic practice is deeply research-based and curiosity-driven—think of the artist's studio as a laboratory. The results of Joyce's inquiries are the fanciful yet rigorous, buoyant yet logical paintings in *Deal, or, How I Became Radioactive*, an exhibition teeming with visually stunning discoveries.

Emily Joyce (b. 1976, Illinois) attended the Glasgow School of Art and the Rhode Island School of Design where she received her BFA in painting. Since 1999 her work has been included in numerous exhibitions at galleries and institutions throughout the US and in Europe. Some highlights include: The Benton Museum of Art (Claremont, CA), *Parallel Play*, The Museum of Contemporary Art (Denver), *Aftereffect: Georgia O'Keeffe and Contemporary Painting*, the Denver Art Museum, Human Resources (Los Angeles), David B. Smith Gallery (Denver), Inman Gallery (Houston), Sara Meltzer Gallery (New York), Berkeley Art Museum and Pacific Film Archive (Berkeley), The Museum of Fine Arts (Houston), Art Pace (San Antonio), The Tang Teaching Museum (Saratoga Springs, NY), Caroline O'Brien Gallery (Amsterdam), The Palais de Tokyo (Paris), and Glassbox (Geneva).
